COURSE DESCRIPTION

The AP Literature and Composition course consists of writing and analysis, i.e. literary analysis, grammar, writing for a purpose, research skills, reading comprehension, etc. The class will address these skills while studying a cursory overview of British literature, focusing heavily on poetry and fiction pieces. Preparation for the AP English Literature and Composition Exam in May 2017 will be a priority using timed writings and multiple choice-close readings, as well as thematic analysis essays for class discussion.

SUMMER READING

Summer reading is expected of all 2016-2017 AP Literature and Composition students. It is essential that students complete the summer reading assignments, as there will be an exam given in the first week of **school**. Failing the summer reading exam may result in removal from the course!

The summer readings that are required are:
